How Can We Reach Youth as Amateur Radio Enthusiasts?

- Clubs can create a Youth Outreach Committee or Appoint a Youth Outreach Specialist
- Must either be adults with Youth Leadership Experience or Youth with Leadership Acumen!
- Clubs can include specific activities for youth only
- Kids Net, Antenna Build for Yount members, classes to build operating skill and experience, Elmer committee, et.
- Help Youth start their own club—(Your ACC can help with that!)
- Visit Schools, STEM groups, Scout Troops, and other youth groups to introduce AND demonstrate Amateur Radio

Speaking of Youth Using Amateur Radio

If a person prepares for small communication events, they will also be ready for last-minute communication requests. For the past few years, our local club has handled the communications for an annual "Fun Run" July event and created an After-Action Report (AAR) to help us improve each year.

A local student at Clearwater Valley High School in Kooskia chose to focus her senior project on raising awareness for breast cancer, a disease that affects 1 in 29 individuals, not just women. As part of her project, she organized a race to promote awareness.

How can we ensure the safety of the participants and the public during a race that takes place on city streets and crosses busy highways? She discussed this issue with a teacher, who happened to be a Ham. He suggested that she reach out to our local Hams for radio support. They apologized for the

short notice of seventeen days. Sufficient time, especially since this race would follow the same course as the summer event.

Our club was between meetings so we successfully

enlisted radio operators by email and text.

We took the AAR created in July and made a couple of adjustments to radio operator placements. This too improved success especially when our cross-band radio that worked before decided to hiccup.

On November 9th, we met Evelyn, a teenager whose infectious smile helped recruit racers from the three nearby schools. By the time the race began, there were 59 participants, including teachers, coaches, students, other runners, and moms pushing baby strollers.

Congratulations to Evelyn for a job well done, and thank you for choosing Hams to assist with your project.






